This opportunity to continue serving and advocating for our dedicated educators is a privilege that I do not take lightly. Thank you for your trust and support—it truly means the world to me.



I would like to congratulate Elizabeth Ryan on being elected as NTA Vice President. In the 26 year history of the NTA, Elizabeth is the first Inuit NTA member to hold the position of NTA Vice President, an accomplishment that should be recognized. I look forward to working with Elizabeth over the next two years and look forward to her input and contributions. I would also like to congratulate Kylie Curry on his re-election as NTA Secretary Treasurer and Emma Pauloosie on her election win for NTA Inuit Member at Large. I am excited to work with this team for the next two years.

As we move forward, I remain committed to addressing the challenges that our teachers face every day. From ongoing staffing shortages to workload concerns, housing challenges, and the need for increased classroom supports, we know that our members are working under difficult conditions. These are not just workplace issues; they impact the quality of education for our students and the well-being of our educators.

At the same time, we are looking for ways to improve the NTA and how we interact with our members. Strengthening communication, increasing engagement, and ensuring that every teacher feels heard and supported are priorities for us. We want to build an even stronger connection with our membership so that we can advocate more effectively and make meaningful progress together.

This year is particularly important as we enter a new round of contract negotiations. In the months ahead, you will receive updates and information about this process, and we encourage all members to stay informed and engaged. Your participation is key—by asking questions, sharing concerns, and staying involved, you help strengthen our collective voice. The NTA is here to support you, and we encourage you to reach out whenever you need clarification or guidance.

Please know that we are working tirelessly to advocate on your behalf. Whether through negotiations, policy discussions, or direct conversations with decision-makers, we are pushing for real solutions that will make a difference in your professional and personal lives. Your voices guide our work, and together, we will continue to fight for the respect, resources, and recognition that Nunavut's educators deserve.

#### **Executive Director's Update**

**John Fanjoy**, Executive Director

I will be using my report to keep folks updated on our collective bargaining progress with the Employer.

On December 30th the NTA officially notified the Minister Responsible for the Public Service Act (Minister Gross) of our intent to officially open negotiations. We were pleased with the quick reply

from the Minister on January 6th, acknowledging our letter and agreeing to bargain as soon as possible. Our initial optimism that



the Employer was engaged in the process has been tempered by their delay in agreeing to an Essential Services Agreement (a required step before bargaining can begin) despite it being

almost a month past the legislated deadline for doing so. We have been in contact with the Department of Human Resources multiple times on this issue and expect it to be resolved soon.

**Thank you** to our members for the great participation rate to the Economic Welfare Survey, we received 437 responses. While we can't share some of the results publicly while bargaining, here are a few demographic stats that stand out:

- $\cdot$  36% of our members identify as Nunavut Inuit. Despite efforts to increase Inuit employment by the GN, that number has been consistent (30-40%) since the NTA began keeping stats in 2008.
- · 12% of our members identify as racialized, or a member of a non-Inuit equity-seeking group.
- $\cdot$  68% of our members are female, and 90% of our Inuit members are female.
- $\cdot$  50% of our members have been working in Nunavut for 5 years or less. This number has doubled in the past 15 years.
- $\cdot$  13% of our members have 20 years or more working experience in Nunavut. This number is less than half of what it was 15 years ago.

#### What are some takeaways I have from these statistics?

- · The approach the Government of Nunavut has taken in the past to recruit Inuit into the teaching profession has not worked. There have been some recent funding announcements that may have a positive effect moving forward, but it's time to think outside the box and look at different paths to the profession. Let's hope.
- · There is a serious shortage of strong Inuit male role models for our young students in schools, which needs to be addressed.
- · The retention crisis in our schools has reached a boiling point. Fewer teachers are deciding to make a career in our schools, for very valid reasons. The education system in Nunavut cannot continue to function, let alone prosper, in an environment of constant turnover and vacant positions. This is all to the detriment of the students we serve, and the long-term teachers that have seen their working conditions deteriorate.

**Finally**, an issue related to bargaining is the potential of a one-time NTA member salary adjustment that the GN may be planning to take effect on June 30th 2025 when our current contract expires. No number has been announced by the Employer at this time, it will require a Memorandum of Understanding signed by the NTA President for it to occur. The Department of Human Resources 2025-26 Business Plan includes an acknowledgment the review is completed and anticipated to be applied at the end of the collective agreement, so that is a positive sign. I do want to point out that if an increase is applied effective June 30th, you actually would not see the increase until your first pay period of the next school year, because the monies you are paid over the summer break are funds that you earned during school year before June 30th, that was held back for you by the Employer.



I have been teaching for 11 years and currently teach at Nakasuk School in Iqaluit. I have taught in various grades and in both the Inuktitut and English language streams. My teaching experience includes Kindergarten, Grades 1 through 4 as a homeroom teacher, as well as Inuktitut Second Language classes from Kindergarten to Grade 5. I love teaching in our language, Inuktitut, and connecting our learning with our culture. I've also led a Drum Club as an extracurricular activity for students, and I thoroughly enjoyed teaching students how to qilaujjaq (drum dance), katajjaq (throat singing), and traditional Inuktitut songs.

I have been involved with the NTA since early in my career and have held various roles, including Communications Liaison, Conference Committee member in 2017/18, and a member of the Inuit Educators Committee. Currently, I sit on the Status of Women Committee, Public Relations, and the Inuit Educators Committee. I started the 2024-2025 school year as the Central Qikiqtani President until the elections in February, and I am now the Vice President.

As an Inuk woman who grew up in Nunavut and went through the education system here, I bring a unique perspective to the work I do in this role. 

Which school and community do you currently work in?

I am currently living in Iqaluit Nunavut and am teaching grade 7 at Aqsarniit Ilinniarvik School. This is my first year as a homeroom teacher.

#### What made you decide to be a teacher?

With a background in environmental science, I have a passion for sustainability, environmental stewardship, and global collaboration. I believe that fostering an appreciation for nature, engaging youth in sustainable practices, and connecting with other cultures around the globe is essential for our society moving forward with our rapidly changing climate, these are our future decision makers after all. In my opinion, education and cross curricular connections are the perfect way to show students the interconnectedness between us, our environment, and the world around us. I wanted to become a teacher to discover how these concepts can be brought into our everyday teaching practices to bring students a hopeful and meaningful understanding of complicated global issues.

What is one of your greatest memories, accomplishments, achievements as a teacher?

Before moving to Nunavut, I participated in a 3-month cross-cultural education exchange in China. 

## Resilience in the Face of Loss: Igloolik Students Reimagine Their Community

On February 12, the community of Igloolik suffered a devastating loss with the destruction of the Kipsigak Arena and BlackBox Studio. These beloved spaces were central to the town's social, recreational, and artistic life, leaving a profound impact on residents. In the wake of this tragedy, Igloolik's youth turned adversity into an opportunity for growth and resilience.




Jennifer McGee-Qaunaq, a Grade 8 teacher in the community, saw the loss as a powerful teaching moment. She encouraged her students to explore the wide-reaching consequences of the arena's destruction, prompting discussions on its social, physical, emotional, and financial impacts. Through these conversations, students reflected on how the arena had fostered community connections, provided a space for physical activity, and supported the well-being of many individuals, particularly youth.



Rather than focusing solely on the loss, McGee-Qaunaq's students channeled their energy into a creative and constructive endeavor: designing their dream arena and community space. They envisioned a facility that would not only replace what was lost but also enhance community engagement, incorporating elements that reflected local needs and aspirations.

On February 21, the students proudly presented their ideas to George Qaunaq, Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) of the Hamlet of Igloolik, in the Chambers. Their proposals demonstrated both innovative thinking and a deep commitment to their community's future. This initiative not only allowed students to express their hopes but also provided an opportunity for their voices to be heard by local leadership. Mr. Qaunaq stated that the students' work would be highlighted at the next council meeting and shared encouraging words with each student.

The students' work serves as a testament to the resilience and creativity of Igloolik's youth. By turning a moment of tragedy into a catalyst for vision and change, they have reinforced the strength of their community and their determination to rebuild for future generations.
